Please write concisely in a coherent manner, with good mechanics and few grammatical and stylistic errors. All formatting in this class will use the APA Manuel: 7th Edition. There are two times when you reference: "in-text citations" and "referencing" books, journals, website, etc. Please ask me, use online references, the APA Manual, the PittState Library, and your friends regarding writing and APA formatting

Course Evaluation Methods

Assignments, Exams, Quizzes, & Participation

Individual Article Summary (4):

You will choose a current event article, based on the topics we have covered so far during the semester. You will write a summary and analysis of the article. It should be 1 page long, front side only, doublespaced, Times New Roman font, 12-point font. Please include your name and the article name and number (see Course Schedule) in the upper right corner. Article summaries are individually done. They will be due on Thursday evening at 11:59 pm on Canvas. An example will be posted on Canvas for you to view. Please make sure to proofread your article summary BEFORE you submit it Thursday evening. There will be four article summaries due throughout the semester (see Course Schedule). Each summary is worth 20 points, for a total of 80 points, or **8%** of your final grade.

Group Article Presentation:

After students submit the individual article summary the following class groups will meet and discuss among themselves. After reviewing for 10-15 minutes, groups will then present the "most interesting" article to the rest of the class. You will be graded on showing up and participating in the discussions and presentations. Failure to show up will result in a zero, unless discussed with Eian days before class. Your quality presentation will be worth 25 points each, for a total of 100 points, or **10%** of your final grade.

Quizzes:

Quizzes will be over the previous chapters for the last couple weeks. There will be 10 multiple choice questions and one short answer question for a total of 25 points. This is designed to help students know how the upcoming tests will be like as it will be structured the same way but smaller. These will be done in class. If every student shows up to class for the weeks between each quiz, every student will receive a 100% and we will discuss the answers in class. This is all or nothing!!! The only exception to a student is if Eian grants one. Failure to show up will result in a zero, unless discussed with Eian days before class.

Exams:

Students will bring a green scantron the day of exams. Exams will consist of 15-30 multiple choice questions for a total of 60 points. The second part of the exams will consist of short answers for 40 points. Questions will come from lectures, discussions, the book, presentations, or anything spoken about in class. A total of 4 exams with only 3 of them going towards your final grade. Failure to complete an exam will result in a zero with no makeup due to dropping one. Only exemptions must be granted from Eian days before the exams.

Project

Proposal:

For the project proposal, groups will submit a one-page paper detailing how they plan on doing their final project. Most of the time putting words on a paper is the hardest part and this is a chance to get a head start and help prepare you for the final project. Groups will be graded on the one-page submission and will receive feedback in person the following week. As long as the proposal is completed with small details (2-3 sentences or bullets) over each section, you will receive credit. It is an all or nothing assignment.

Group Conferences:

You and your group will meet with me two times, each worth 10 points (20 points total – or about 2% of your final grade).

Written Final Report:

The final project will be a 5-page paper on "Marketing your Major" detailing all the sections listed under the project files. This is worth **12.5%** of your overall grade! A great paper will be organized and have great selling points in your major. Students will have opportunities to work in class on either paper or presentations. If that time is not enough, students will meet on their own to complete the assignment. Don't wait until the last week! I WILL KNOW!

Final Project Presentation:

You will you present your project – format will be determined by the class. See Canvas for more details.

Midterm & Final Group Peer Review:

Students in their groups will have a chance to review their peers on how they have contributed to the group projects. This is to help me understand who is helping and who isn't. Students that receive a low peer review can be subject to a separate grade than the rest of the group for their lack of effort (a lower grade) and vice versa. This is worth 25 points each and the grade received will be given from the other peers' reviews.

Meeting with Eian:

This is required! This meeting is to help me get to know you and for you to know me. You can bring questions on how the class will go. The meeting will be due within the first 2 weeks of school. On the first day I will hand out a sheet to get to know you and will talk about it in the meeting. This is something I've had other teachers do for my classes and I really enjoyed it. Helps you understand what to expect throughout the year. The grade will be based on if you had the meeting or not – again it is required! Failure to do so may result in a dropped letter grade! The meeting itself is worth 10 points, or 1% of your final grade.

Midterm Class Evaluation:

An extra credit opportunity to help me figure out what is working and what isn't. I will either hand out a piece of paper in class to fill out or have an assignment under Canvas for it. It will be worth 10 points, or 1% of your letter grade. The actual evaluation will be anonymous, so the grade will be all or nothing, if you completed it or not.

Discussion/Class Participation:

The purpose of this class is to have many discussions and class participation. I do not want this to be structured as a lecture and leave class but rather as a conversation with the whole class. If students do not participate, I will have a conversation with you over your participation in hopes it will pick up. If it doesn't, Points will be deducted as this part is worth 40 points the whole year. A rubric will also be uploaded in files for more detail and information.

Attendance:

You are an adult and this is your education so I cannot and will not force you to come. However, failure to attend class will result in a lower grade. Students who attend classes will see better results in their grade! Here is my attendance policy

- After three unexcused absences four points will be deducted from your grade.
- For an absence to be excused, you must discuss with me at least two days before the absence.
- I will follow PSU policy regarding COVID and other illnesses.
- Inclement weather: Cancellations due to inclement weather will result in assignments due by the next class.

There are numerous assignments and quizzes that can be "free" points if you attend/participate and class. I don't want to fail students but a direct result in no attendance can result in failure. If I am unable to make it to class, I reserve the right to provide either an assignment or an online lecture. Those will consist of either a video, zoom, or something else discussed. I don't expect this to happen.
