Dr. Megan Westhoff is in her fifth year leading our program and will direct our final production of the season. Mr. Linden Little again showcases his directing talents by opening our season and also continues as Technical Director and Designer of each performance. Alongside Mr. Little for our opening production will be Musical Director

Patrick Howle who serves as an Instructional Professor in Voice and Opera for the Department of Music at Pittsburg State. Ms. Lisa Quinteros continues as our Costume Designer/Wardrobe Supervisor. Be whisked away for a weekend in the country through our collaboration with PSU Opera and the Bicknell Family Center for the Arts.

On December 6-7, we invite you to enjoy our COMM 544 Stage Direction class's "public final exam" as they present *Theatre Unplugged*. Always fascinating, always popular and always FREE of charge!!

Dr. Cynthia Allan directs our third production on February 27-March 2, *Exit, Pursued by a Bear.* Chase the winter blues away with this comedy from award-winning playwright Lauren Gunderson, one of our best and sharpest voices in contemporary American theatre. Set in North Georgia, watch how Shakespearean-inspired revenge plays out against a backdrop of strippers, venison, and a LOT of honey.

Our final production of the season on April 24-27 is *Love/Sick* directed by Dr. Megan Westhoff. Somewhere in suburban America, nine different couples are at a relationship crossroads. Whether it's new beginnings, broken hearts, or second chances, this humorous and heart-wrenching dark comedy explores the pleasure and the pain of being in love.

Dírector's Note

Linden Little

A Little Night Music has been a touchstone show for me. A title that reappears from time to time like a close friend that's come to visit. I first encountered it on a compilation CD of Broadway's greatest overtures and was struck by the lush ornamentation of the vocals. I did not know the story. I had only a fragment to fuel my imagination. This would become an apt first encounter. Since, from my vantage point today, the musical is about the details we remember from intense moments of heightened desire. "The canopy in red or was it blue?" Desire sharpens and shatters our sensory experiences. Leaving only a glimmer of dusky light to our perception.

This is the second time Pitt State Theatre has produced this work, a rarity as we are always striving to do something new or different. I was lucky to witness that first production which happened to be director John Green's last production at Pitt. A smile from one who knew much, to me, the very young. The cast was full of many friends who dazzled me with the structure of the piece. I discovered waltz time could hold many varied experiences.

The next time I sought out a Chicago production in my sophomore year of undergrad. It was a Christmas present to myself. The scenic design layered in the imagery of Gustav Klimt. A solid dramaturgical choice, but one that ended up competing with the music. This is why the scenic design you see tonight is minimal. Sometimes it best to see with your ears.

That brings us to today. The fourth time I've experienced Sondheim's *A Little Night Music*. I want to thank PSU Opera Workshop and the Bicknell Family Center for the Arts for their collaboration efforts. This is our first time together in the Scott Performance Hall and that would not have been possible without their support.

Costume Designer Note Lisa Quinteros

The costumes for *A Little Night Music* are a broad sweep of clothing from the very beginning of the Edwardian Era, set in 1900, the turn of a century, and a departure from the incredibly long Victorian Era. It would prove to be a short one, lasting just from 1900 till about 1914. In that time, clothing changed rapidly for women, with but a few new additions for men. By the teens, dresses went from full with trains and sweeping lace, large A-line petticoats and an S-Curve corset silhouette, to straight skirted, no-fullness dresses with button trims and geometric, asymmetric décor, from *My Fair Lady* to *Titanic*. It was quite a rapid period of change.

Very often, women took their clothing from the 1870's, 80's and 90's and re-worked, re-set and re-sewed them with new lines, shapes, and changes to become current fashions of the day. Much of our wardrobe for *A Little Night Music* has been treated in this same fashion: a mixture of newly made and older re-worked design styles from our existing costume wardrobe closet given new forms, for a new story.

A Little Night Music takes place over a few short days, culminating on the longest day of light, during the Summer, in Sweden. The fall of dusk seems to last forever as the sun is in a beautiful, long-extended sunset.

The Night Singers, representations of remembrance and emotion, floating through the scenes of the characters, are as pieces of that beautiful sunset, dressed in purples, pinks, oranges, creams and all colors of green, grey and brown in shadows, hovering just above the edges of Night.

Although the setting is in Sweden, I have chosen to use a generalized design aspect of the 1900's rather than geographic area-specific, using trends that were more widespread over the whole of the world. Memory changes and fades, enhances and dissolves the same for everyone, everywhere, regardless of where you are. It is about that particular item that memory collects, and recollects, often attaching it to strong emotions... that particular pink dress, that parasol, the lovely cravat (with the blue and grey, and that enchanting cologne!) the dashing dragoon coat with the flash of gold.....Remember?

I hope for you that years from now, you also will, still.

Thank you my lovely crew, who did so many extended hours of work to produce such wonderful things.
