FACULTY SENATE MINUTES October 28, 2024

The Pittsburg State University Faculty Senate met at 3:00 p.m. on Monday, October 28, 2024 with Norm Philipp, President, president, presiding.

Past Minutes

Minutes from the September 30, 2024 meeting were approved.

Guest Speaker

Stu Hite shared a number of updates from University Police and Parking Services (UPPS). UPPS is now on the second floor of Horace Mann and will remain in Horace Mann until the new KBI building is done. KBI Special Agents are also occupying the second floor, East side of the building. It was also shared that an AED unit can now be found in every building on campus. In addition, NARCAN units can also be found with the AED units. It's important to identify where these units are in your primary building. The AED units are very easy to use. Step by step directions are provided on demand. NARCAN units include two doses of a nasal spray. No priming is required. There is no harm in given the medication to someone who has not overdosed. In person training is available by the CHC. A postcard was also passed out (see attached copy at the end of the minutes) discussing Fentanyl and included a QR code for a free kit and test strips. Faculty were encouraged to contact UPPS with any questions.

Announcements

Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs - Dr. Susan Bon

Provost Bon started by sharing the positive enrollment news for Fall 2024. Fall 2024 is the first time in awhile that we have seen a total increase in enrollment.

Provost Bon confirmed that the Writing to Learn (WL) program would be suspended effective Spring 2025. Stipends will still be paid to those faculty with WL courses on the Spring 2025 course schedule. Provost Bon is working on establishing an Innovative Academic Grant program that will focus on General Education courses. Other possible grant programs will be discussed as a possible way to reward faculty for using best practices in the classroom.

The Research and Sponsored Programs office will be moving from Block 22 to campus. This will provide a more direct line to Academic Affairs and increase flexibility. There have been discussions to increase faculty representation on the IRB. More information will be shared as decisions are made.

Provost Bon expressed the importance of interest-based bargaining as negotiations begin with KNEA. The goal is for all parties to be good partners and to consider what is in the best interest for all. Advising and mentoring has already been considered as a topic for discussion. Other ideas are welcome. Feel free to contact Provost Bon or President Philipp.

Lastly, Provost Bon shared that she spoke with President Philipp regarding the selection of faculty for the Academic Honors committee. It may be necessary to select committee members in the Spring to better align with the work of the committee. In addition, a training document would be helpful as committee members frequently rotate. Risk planning has been a recent topic discussed at President's Cabinet. These discussions are on-going. On May 20th and 21st there will be a cybersecurity conference on campus. There is no charge to those who would like to participate.

PSU/KNEA -Khamis Siam, President

In new business, it was suggested that a guest speaker be invited to an upcoming meeting to discuss the Gorilla Rising project. In addition, a question was asked about the future of the swimming pool in the Weede. President Philipp will check with Facilities Planning.

It was announced the Crossland College of Technology Open House is scheduled for November 1st. All are welcome. In addition, there will be a Student Art Exhibit in Porter Hall on October 30th from 5-7pm. And, lastly, there is an Authors' Reception scheduled in Axe Library on November 7th at 3pm.




The Chocolate Chip Cookie Effect

Because fentanyl is never evenly distributed throughout a street pill, some parts of the pill may contain no fentanyl while other parts contain a lot!

Once a pill is pressed, the components are locked in place. This is called the chocolate chip cookie effect.

Where is the fentanyl hiding in your street pill? Laboratory testing indicates 7 out of 10 pills seized by the DEA contain a deadly dose of fentanyl.
