Russian Renaissance October 5, 2018

After emerging with the \$100,000 Grand Prize at the 2017 M-Prize Competition, the largest prize for chamber music in the world, Russian Renaissance has firmly established itself as one of the most electrifying and exhilarating ensembles of today. Through stunning performances of everything from tango to folk to jazz, Russian Renaissance is redefining the possibilities of their traditional Russian folk



instruments (balalaika, domra/domra alto, button accordion, and balalaika contrabasso) and capturing the attention of audiences worldwide.

What makes Russian Renaissance truly special is their ability both to dazzle with breathtaking style and to touch the hearts of listeners of all ages and backgrounds. In addition to their success at the M-Prize Competition, Russian Renaissance also received 1st prize at the 69th Coupe Mondiale in Russia in 2016 and was named Musical America's *New Artist of the Month* (March 2018).

In the 2018-19 season, Russian Renaissance will release their debut recording on Azica Records, featuring the works that catapulted them to international fame at the M-Prize competition and that highlight their self-proclaimed slogan of "World music with a Russian soul."

Marguerite Krull, soprano November 9, 2018



Possessed of keen musical intelligence and a vocal range from high lyric mezzo-soprano to soprano, Marguerite Krull is at home performing music from the Baroque to the brand new.

With her probing musical curiosity she has embraced an unusually varied list of roles from Emilia in Handel's Flavio, with New York City Opera, to Belle in Philip Glass's La belle et la bête with the Oakland Opera, and the title role of Martín y Soler's La capricciosa corretta, performed in Lausanne, Bordeaux, and Madrid and recorded for the Naïve/Naxos label. She has enjoyed a special relationship with the Caramoor International Music Festival where she has performed four Rossini heroines: Rosina in Il barbiere di Siviglia, Ninetta in La gazza ladra, the title role of La donna del lago, and Desdemona in Rossini's Otello.

On the concert stage she has sung varied repertoire, several highlights of which include Harbison's *Mirabai Songs* with the New York Philharmonic, Mozart's *Mass in C Minor* with the Buffalo Philharmonic, and Carissimi's *Jepthe* with the American Bach Soloists.

Ms. Krull is a recipient of the prestigious Marian Anderson Foundation Award, an honor given in alternate years to "an American singer of great promise who has already achieved some success in opera, in recital, and in the orchestra/oratorio repertory."

Behzod Abduraimov, piano

January 18, 2019

Described by The Times as the "master of all he surveys," and with The Washington Post noting to "keep your ear on this one," Behzod's captivating performances continue to receive international praise.

Recent seasons have seen Behzod work with leading orchestras worldwide such as the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Boston Symphony, Münchner Philharmoniker, NHK Symphony and Leipzig Gewandhaus orchestras, and prestigious conductors including Valery Gergiev, Vladimir Ashkenazy, Manfred Honeck, Vasily Petrenko, James Gaffigan, Jakub Hrůša and Vladimir Jurowski.

Upcoming European highlights include the Lucerne Festival, Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra, Münchner Philharmoniker, hr-Sinfonieorchester, Philharmonia, Czech Philharmonic, and BBC Symphony orchestras. In North America

Behzod appears at the Hollywood Bowl, Carnegie Hall, Blossom and Ravinia Festivals. He made his debut with the San Francisco Symphony and returned to both the Dallas and Atlanta Symphony Orchestras.

Behzod is an alumnus of Park University's International Center for Music where he studied with Stanislav Ioudenitch, and now serves as the ICM's artist-in-residence.



Founded by baroque oboist Debra Nagy in 2009, Les Délices has established a reputation for their unique programs that are "thematically concise, richly expressive, and featuring composers few people have heard of." The New York Times added, "Concerts and recordings by Les



Délices are journeys of discovery." The group's debut CD was named one of the "Top Ten Early Music Discoveries of 2009" (NPR's Harmonia), and their performances have been called "a beguiling experience" (Cleveland Plain Dealer), "astonishing" (ClevelandClassical.com), and "first class" (Early Music America Magazine).

Highlights from recent seasons included performances for Music Before 1800, Boston's Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, San Francisco Early Music Society, the Yale Collection of Musical Instruments, and at Columbia University's Miller Theater. The ensemble's third CD, "Age of Indulgence," was released on the Navona label in June 2017.

For their Pittsburg performance, Les Délices will present a program titled Mozart in Paris. Accompanied by readings from Mozart's humorous letters, the ensemble will create a context for Mozart's time in the City of Light by setting his beloved Quartet for oboe and strings alongside works by composers whose music was all the rage: Boccherini, Gluck, and others.
